Frequently Asked Questions

What exactly does a Student Assistant do?

The Student Assistant job description is as follows:

PRIMARY FUNCTION: To gain knowledge of various art and publishing programs including Quark Express and Adobe Photoshop, to write, design, and publish annual magazine *Urban Interview*, to maintain Youth Publications section of the Warhol website.

PRE-EMPLOYMENT TRAINING

- Practicing artist or writer.
- Collaborative and creative team player that also works well on own initiative
- Basic knowledge of computer programs e.g. MS Word, Photoshop, Quark
- Strong interest in popular culture and contemporary social, artistic and cultural issues.
Basic knowledge of Andy Warhol a plus, but not necessary.

What will my hours be like?

Student Assistants work 9 hours a week. Tuesdays through Thursdays, from 4pm – 7pm. There are occasionally outreach programs and various events that you may be asked to work. These are paid hours, and also pretty fun ones at that.

Will I get paid?

You sure will. Youth Publications is a paid internship, so you'll be getting money to learn. The Artist Apprentice position pays \$5.50 / hour.

Do I need to know anything about Andy Warhol?

It's good to at least know who he is, but what you don't know, you'll end up learning about him. You'll learn about his artistic practices, and some of the more prevalent social situations that he had to do with (the Exploding Plastic Inevitable, etc.)

What will I do?

Youth Publications is all about learning how to create media for print and digital display from scratch; whether it be your own individual zine, updating your section of the website, or working on the main focus of the program, *Urban Interview*. Additionally, you'll learn various art projects used in our Weekend Factories and Outreach programs.

What do I need to know about computers?

It's good to have a general understanding of how computers work (typing, e-mail, navigating, etc.) but you will learn a lot about various applications and programs such as Adobe Photoshop, Adobe Premiere, Macromedia Dreamweaver, and Quark Xpress.

Will it be fun?!

Everything at the Warhol is fun!
